These issues include the protection of children from abuse and neglect, preservation of the environment, protecting the Commonwealth's financial assets, the protection of consumers, and public safety.

WHO WE ARE

The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) is constitutionally created pursuant to the NMI Constitution, ART. 11I, § 11, as an independent agency within the Executive Branch. The Office of the Attorney General is headed by an Attorney General elected to a four-year term. The Attorney General is the Chief Legal Officer of the Commonwealth Government and is responsible for:

- Providing legal advice to the Governor and Executive Departments including public corporations and autonomous agencies;
- Representing the Commonwealth in all legal matters and;
 - Prosecuting violations of commonwealth law.

OUR PROGRESS

ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

- Prevailed in: Litigation cases (6) and Administrative matters (5)
- Brought administrative actions against Imperial Pacific International for failure to abide by the Casino License Agreement, pay its annual licensing fee and casino regulatory fee, and comply with orders of the Commonwealth Casino Commission
- Prevailed on a mandamus regarding discovery (Rudolph, 2020 MP 22)
- Successfully transferred an offender from juvenile court to adult court and was charged with sexual assault in the first degree
- Passage of the Office of the Attorney General's legislative initiative Public Law 22-06 to protect the people of the Commonwealth from per and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) contamination of our groundwater supply
- ❖ Joined numerous states, territories, counties, and cities from across the county in a landmark lawsuit against Johnson & Johnson and their U.S. based Janssen Pharmaceutical Companies over the companies' misconduct in the sale of opioids. The Commonwealth will receive settlement funds over a multi-year period beginning 2022 for opioid abatement-related programs and projects
- Settled with McKinsey & Company Inc., United States, related to claims against McKinsey in the Opioid Multi-State Litigation and received settlement amount for opioid abatement-related programs and projects
- Settled with American Honda Motor Company related to defective airbag and received settlement amount
- Succeeded in a mandamus against a Superior Court's order requiring discovery for preliminary hearings in criminal cases

WHAT'S NEXT

HIGHLIGHTS:

- ❖ Provided legal guidance to the Commonwealth's response to the global COVID-19 pandemic on the implementation of emergency service.
- * Resolved seventeen (17) contested litigation and administrative matters.
- ❖ Guilty jury verdict in child abuse trial CR 20-0119-A CNMI vs. Stacy Laniyo.
- ❖ Improved coordination with CHCC psychiatric support by coordinating with the Public Defender's Office and psychiatrists on treatment of offenders with substantial mental health issues.
- ❖ Filed an Amicus Brief in the U.S. Supreme Court supporting Guam in which the Justices voted 9-0 in favor of Guam that it could seek contribution from the U.S. Federal Government for cleanup of the Ordot dump.
- ❖ The Office's case management software was upgraded to the latest version which improved database functionality and enhanced data quality.

KEY INITIATIVES FOR 2022:

- Continue to provide legal advice and guidance to the Executive Branch, Departments and Agencies and to represent the Commonwealth in the trial court, and on matters currently on appeal.
- Focus on illegal business practices that hurt our consumers and other business; implement consumer awareness programs, and investigate consumer complaints.
- **Continue** to promote and ensure an open and transparent government.
- * Continue to work on new procurement regulations for the government and provide training to agencies.
- **&** Continue to explore solutions to mental health issues in the criminal justice system.
- * Continue to collaborate with other jurisdictions to expand resource activities to combat illegal drug and criminal activity in the CNMI.
